

It is mandatory that you download proof of payment of the Contribution Vie Etudiante et de Campus (CVEC) – the student and campus life contribution fee before you can enroll in your institution.

Take note! Even if you have a pre-registration letter, you are not officially enrolled.

You must validate your enrollment with the institution's Service de la Scolarité (Admissions) as soon as you arrive.

RESIDENCE PERMIT

Information

· At the Welcome Desk in Maison de l'Etudiant. To simplify administrative procedures for international students, Prefecture staff accepts applications for residence permits (first-time applications or renewal) directly at the Maison de l'Etudiant, from September to January, and on certain other university campuses.

GOOD TO KNOW

- If you arrive in France with a VLS-TS long-term student visa: you must validate it online within three months of arrival: https://administration-etrangers-en-france.interieur.gouv.fr
- If you are an Algerian national: depending on your campus, your residence permit application is made at the Préfecture or with the Service des Relations Internationales at your campus.

Take note: to renew your residence permit, you must apply within two months prior to its expiry.



OPENING A BANK ACCOUNT

If you stay in France for more than 3 months, it will be **much easier day-to-day if you open a bank account**, online or in one of the 200 bank agencies located in Nice.

In France, opening a bank account is a right: www.service-public.fr > Argent > Comptes bancaires> Droit au compte (> Finances > Bank Accounts > Right to Open an Account)

HEALTH CARE

In France, receiving medical treatment is **practically** free but you must be insured. As a result, signing up for medical insurance is mandatory.

As a student, you can also take advantage of the university medical services. In these health services where consultations are free, you'll be greeted by a team of doctors, nurses, and social workers who can give personalized advice in terms of health and prevention.

That's the case at Sophia Antipolis University (member of Côte d'Azur University), which has a Service Universitaire de Médecine Préventive et de Promotion de la Santé (SUMPPS), the interuniversity health services and a health center (Unisanté) open to all students.

The "garantie risques locatifs" - rental risk guarantee - is housing insurance which you can you subscribe with your bank or a private insurance company.



- Promenade des Anglais, an emblem of Nice, the magnificent promenade along the Bay of Angels.
- Place Masséna, built in the 1840s and the heart of Nice.
- Vieux Nice, old town, with small streets typical of the south.
- Place Garibaldi, one of the most beautiful squares in Nice with its ochre buildings and green shutters.
- Castle hill which overlooks the port and Vieux Nice, to admire the panorama of Nice and the Bay of Angels.
- Massena Museum, a magnificent villa surrounded by gardens, houses the Nice History Museum.
- the Nice Gallo-Roman archeological site with its ancient thermal baths.
- National Sport Museum, one of the most important sporting collections in the world.
- the Cimiez arena gardens, on the hills of Nice, a vast olive grove with free access to the lawns.
- Marc Chagall Museum and the Matisse Museum, at the heart of the Cimiez gardens.
